Former U.S. Sec. of VA, Army to Give 2014 Edward R. Roybal Memorial Lecture

The Honorable Togo D. West Jr., former U.S. Secretary of Veterans Affairs and former U.S. Secretary of the Army, will deliver the 2014 Edward R. Roybal Memorial Lecture. Lucille Roybal-Allard, the event honors the late congressman who was a champion for civil rights, equal opportunity and the establishment of aging services.
