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USC Project Helps Local High School Students Learn About Their Family Histories

WHAT:

The USC Edward R. Roybal Institute on Aging at the USC School of Social Work is hosting a special evening of student-produced movies about family histories.

The event represents the culmination of the Intergenerational Interview Project, a class assignment conceived by the USC School of Social Work's Hortensia Amaro, USC associate provost of community research initiatives, for high school students of the Community Health Advocates School (CHAS) at the Augustus Hawkins Schools for Community Action campus in South Los Angeles. CHAS' mission is to nurture, empower and inspire future social workers and community health advocates of South Los Angeles, as well as to groom the next generation of transformative leaders locally and globally.
